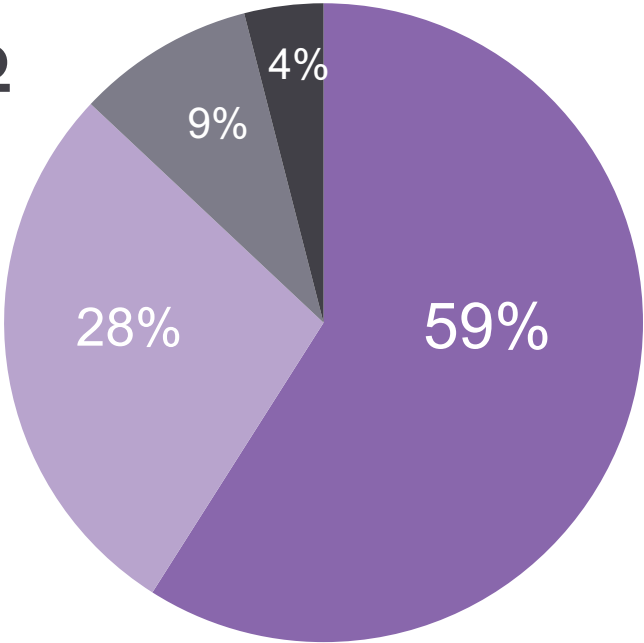
Nationally representative sample

Nearly 9 in 10 voters feel that there should be another round on COVID-19 relief from Congress.

Probably no: 9%



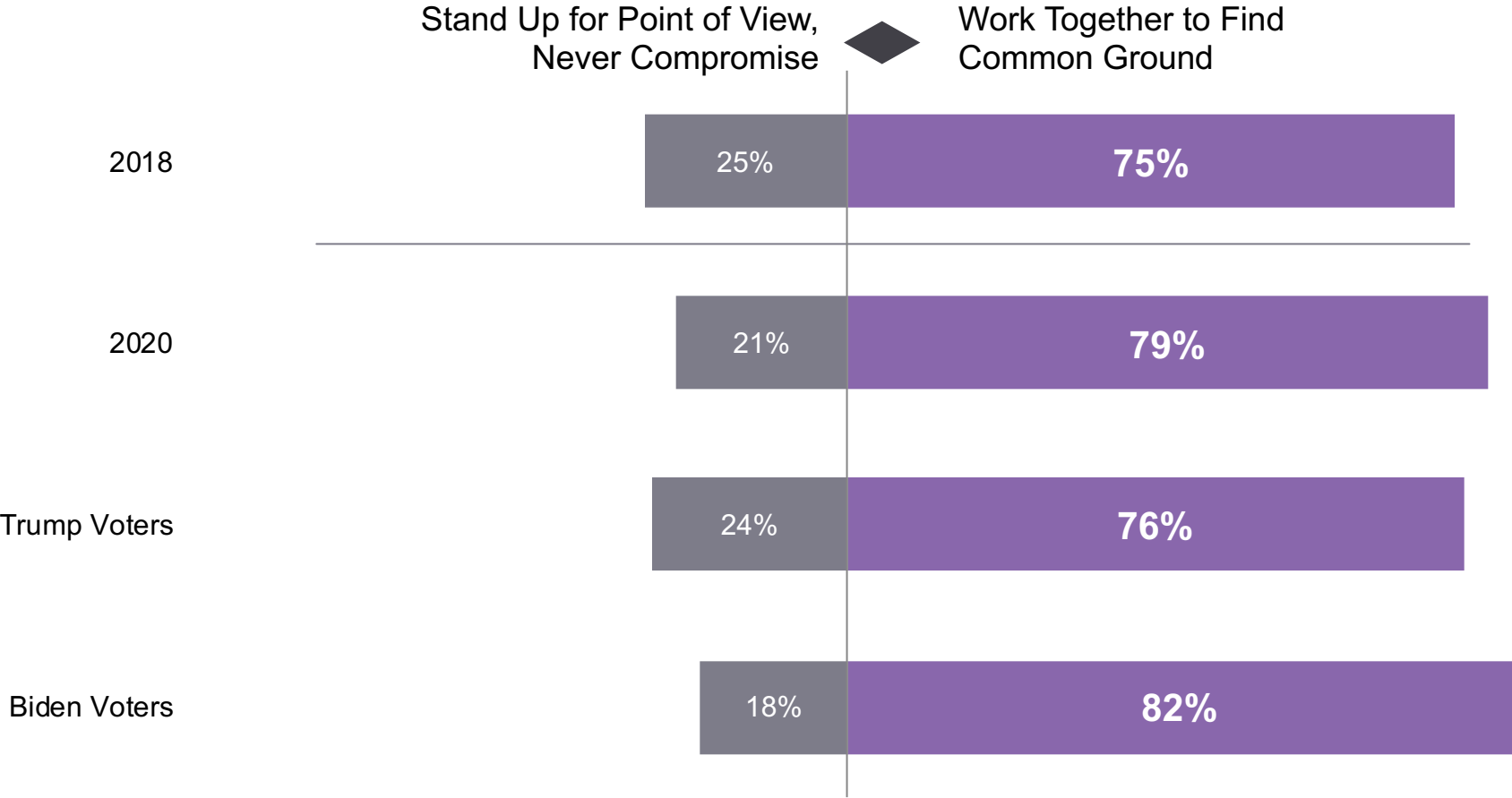
87% Total Yes

Support is so strong for another round of COVID-19 relief legislation from Congress that **every type of subgroup, voter group, and region supports it.**

Eight out of ten (79%) say that we must work together to find common ground. Biden and Trump voters concur.
